CENTURY OF CENTS

Alberta's Salute to 100 Years of 4-H in Canada

As a way to celebrate 100 years of 4-H in Canada, as well as the end of the Canadian penny in 2013, a yearlong collection of pennies and history will result in a single large wall mounted plaque to be displayed at the Alberta 4-H Centre. Each year from 1913 – 2013 will contain two items: a penny made in that year, and a 4-H Alberta highlight featuring a club, event, camp, program, location, sponsor, or other. Accompanying the plaque, an album will showcase each year with a photo and brief summary of the particular 4-H Alberta highlight.

Throughout 2013, 4-H clubs and applicants for each year of Century of Cents are encouraged to collect pennies and coins of all denominations. Coins will be combined at year-end and funds donated to the 4-H Alberta Legacy Fund as well as the Food Bank.

BE PART OF CENTURY OF CENTS!

4-H Alberta's clubs, leaders, programs, staff, alumni, and sponsors all have the chance to be part of our province's unique initiative to celebrate 100 years of 4-H in Canada. **Here's how**:

STEP 1	CHOOSE A YEAR	4-H Alberta has an incredible history! Be part of showcasing that history by choosing an important event, milestone, or achievement. Note the year that it occurred.
STEP 2	FIND A PENNY	Sift through your can of change to locate a penny that was made in the same year as your 4-H highlight. Gather up all other coins for the year-long collection of coins by 4-H Alberta.
STEP 3	APPLY	Apply to have your highlight selected as the feature for a particular year (application on reverse). You may apply for up to three years.
STEP 4	AWAIT CONFIRMATION	Based on the applications received, members of the 4-H Alberta Centennial Committee will designate highlight(s) for every year from 1913 – 2013. All applicants will be notified about the status of their application.
STEP 5	CAPTURE THE CELEBRATION SUBMIT BY SEPTEMBER 31 ST	Congratulations! If your 4-H highlight was selected as the feature for a particular year, it's time to celebrate. Gather your year's penny and the important people that are part of your highlight – capture the celebration with a photograph that will become part of the album showcasing 4-H Alberta's history over the past century.

Have a penny? While we hope to find a penny for every year from 1913 – 2013, some years could be difficult to locate. If you have pennies, particularly from the early years, that you're willing to donate to 4-H Alberta Century of Cents, it would be greatly appreciated.

Cleaver Kids

In the 2012 - 2013 club year, 317 Cleaver Kids joined 107 clubs to learn about all that 4-H is. Over the course of this four year pilot, the number of Cleaver Kids in the province has grown. In addition to measuring participation numbers, the pilot has also measured the degree to which clubs can successfully provide programming and opportunities for nurturing future 4-H members and families.

Cleaver Kids can be a great way to involve younger siblings of current 4-H members who are already attending club activities. By offering them ageappropriate and introductory 4-H programming at the club level, Cleaver Kids can learn about 4-H and kick start their 4-H journey. Plus, your club will have future members to count on!

It's up to the club to decide if they wish to welcome Cleaver Kids and how they will involve these six to eight year olds in their club. The Cleaver Kid experience will be as unique as the club they are a part of. There are basic requirements for having Cleaver Kids. There should also be a plan and clear expectations for how they and their families will be engaged in the club as well as a leader who will coordinate their involvement.

We want Cleaver Kids to succeed and have fun, and to get the whole family excited about joining 4-H. One of the most important things to keep mind, for both Cleaver Kids as well as members, is that club level activities should be progressive and age appropriate from year to year. When making a plan for your club, always keep in mind that it should be fun, fresh and increasingly challenging for Cleaver Kids and members as they grow in 4-H.

Simply learning the pledge, coloring a picture of Cleaver the Beaver or doing a hands-on introductory activity around a project (like building a clay model farm-yard) may be enough for a Cleaver Kid but will certainly not hold the attention of an Intermediate member. Knowing that next year will bring new challenges, experiences and learning opportunities is what will transition Cleaver Kids into members and keep members coming back year after year. When program planning for the whole club, ask yourself what are the intriguing aspects of the club experience that will retain and encourage the Cleaver Kid to become a Junior and other members to continue through to a Senior?

At the end of the year, clubs with Cleaver Kids should reflect on what the Cleaver Kids, leaders and families discovered and experienced by being part of the club. Ask questions and use the feedback to evolve and grow Cleaver Kid involvement in your club.

Thank you to each Cleaver Kid, leader and family member that are currently helping to develop tomorrow's 4-H members.

Claresholm 4-H Nimble Fingers

For the last five years we have attended the Claresholm Resource Fair to promote our club and teach more people about 4-H. We promote our club in the schools and try expand peoples' understanding of all that 4-H is. People are very excited to learn that their kids can gain the advantages of all 4-H has to offer in terms of leadership and communications skills, without having to have an animal.

In the past we added a boy's craft project which increased our numbers. So this year, we changed those projects up (airplane model, rockets, robotics) and added a foods project to attract male members – and it worked!

To keep the older members interested we encourage them to do a creative options project. This year we have members doing digital photography, fiber arts, jewelry making, food preservation and sewing a grad dress.

We have found that it is very important to create clear expectations for being a 4-H member or parent. Don't assume that new 4-H families, or even seasoned ones, are aware of all that comes with being a part of the club or taking on a new project. To prevent member-loss or parent-burnout we emphasize what exactly comes along with being a 4-H member and parent from the beginning.

This year we even created an information sheet for perspective new members that explained the five basic member expectations so parents know exactly what we need from them during the year. We believe these simple steps helped us to recruit, and retain, 16 new members!

To recruit new members we advertised in the local paper and created a flyer that was distributed to local schools, targeting grades of five and six. This age group is where we saw the most growth.

The projects we offered this year were equine, canine, crafts, photography, and woodworking. Our members are junior and intermediate and are very enthusiastic about their projects.

The best thing about our fairly new club is seeing the members discover all that 4-H is. We have excellent support from the parents of our members and we also have seven new leaders assisting with club and project activities. clubs did recruit new members!

Hinton High Rock Riders 4-H Club – New Club!

After noticing an increased demand for riding lessons in the community, our current project leader started asking families if they'd be interested in starting a new 4-H club. With multiple families interested in starting a club, an information night open to anyone in the community was held. A Power Point about 4-H and the light-horse project was shown and any questions answered. We also set up a booth at the Registration Fair held every fall by the Town of Hinton. With this, and a lot of word of mouth recruitment, the club started up in the fall of 2012 with 22 members!

We are offering a horsemanship level 1-3 and 4-7. However, next year may bring different projects our way! We have a great club, full of helpful families. Our new club wouldn't be the success that it is without the support of the Madison Avenue Training Stables in Hinton. Thanks to the support of them and our community, we look forward a bright future for our club.

Conflict Management Series: Responding To Emails

onversations are had using words, gestures, facial expressions, body language, tone of voice and volume. While email is a form of communication, it is not a conversation. This is important to remember when you hit the reply button after receiving an email.

So, if you've added some emoticons and used what you'd consider positive language, don't assume the reader it will interpret the message how you feel you've written it. Just as an initial email can trigger an emotional response that a person did or did not intend, so too can the reply.

So how do you reply to an email that has you emotionally charged?

- 1. Sleep on it. And if you can't get a good night's sleep between receiving the email, writing a response and then hitting the send button, at least take a time out. Go for a quick walk, get a cup of tea, do something to decompress and then come back to your email reply. Read it over, is it really what you want to say or can you say it with a different tone? Often I will get someone else to read my response over (maintaining total confidentiality) to see and determine if it contains anything that the read may perceive as "attitude". A fresh set of eyes can be effective.
- 2. Unless it is necessary, do not "reply all". Only use reply all if you are confident that "all" will be interested in your response or need to be aware of your response. If you and the sender disagree on something, do you think others really need to know or are you hoping that by "reply all" you will get more people in your corner, on side in line with your way of thinking?

Don't use reply all to e-tattle, scold, correct or send nasty comments back to the sender because you found their email offensive. This may be a very important time to pick up the phone and ask for some clarification. If a correction needs to be made, allow the sender to make that change. We all want the chance to "save face" and by having some private dialogue, that opportunity is much greater.

Right now, or with your whole club at your next meeting, I encourage you to take the E-mail Etiquette Pledge! It can be found online at www.emailetiquettepledge.com/take-the-pledge/. It goes like this:

- "As a concerned "Netizen" who enjoys communicating with technology in an informed and courteous manner; who doesn't want to see the online world loose its humanity, I hereby take the following E-mail Etiquette Pledge:
- I will do my best and make an effort to learn about and follow proper E-mail Etiquette so I can communicate with courtesy and clarity so as to avoid misunderstandings. E-mail is not just about me — it is about the person on the other side of the screen as well!

- I will do my best to ensure I don't hide behind this screen to say and do things I would otherwise not do if face-to-face with those I e-mail. I will type to others as I would have them type unto me!
- I will do my best to make an effort to understand technology enough to be able to use it properly so that my lack of knowledge doesn't have a negative impact on those I communicate with.
- By taking the above simple pledge, I hope to help encourage other on-liners to not use this wonderful technology as an excuse to be lazy or not do what is right but rather as a reason to reach out and communicate as educated, civil, caring and courteous human beings."

I would encourage everyone to embrace this pledge and to please respond with care. How you choose to respond to an email can mean the difference between an efficient exchange of information and a full-blown e-war of words. And remember, that choice is up to you!

Improving Club Safety is Simple!

There's no doubt about it: 4-H clubs are always busy with meetings, project work, community service, social events, shows and much more! To keep everything running smoothly, members serve on the club executive, support positions and committees. With everyone working towards the greater good of the club, no wonder successful years are always well within reach! While all these club activities are fun and exciting, they can come with risks to health and safety. Does your club have a safety representative or safety committee?

For some, knowing how to best approach safety can bring about uncertainty. Truthfully, the most successful safety approach is the one that's designed with your club's members and activities in mind.

Safety Representatives or Committees may:

- **Encourage** conversations by starting meetings with a 'Safety Minute' to discuss a safety topic
- **Work** with leaders to write a club safety plan. The plan could cover topics like: emergency procedures, appointing a first aider at events, livestock handling guidelines at shows, and boundaries around bullying or horseplay
- **Assist** with pre-event inspections to look for hazardous

issues, then decide on a suitable solution

- **Remind** members to wear protective gear like helmets, close-toed shoes and safety glasses
- **Poll** the club on first aid training needs, then seek prices to host a training day
- **Help** leaders ensure activities follow insurance rules, that fire exits are not blocked or that room capacities are not exceeded **Of course, representing safety has its fun side, too!**
- **Promote** safety through events like colouring contests, poster competitions, or year-end celebrations
- Invite a guest speaker to talk about what safety means to them
- **Request** an interactive safety display for a district or regional 4-H events
- **Sign up** for the Safety Wranglers Club through the Alberta Farm Safety Program
- **Book** a tour at a safety supply store to learn about protective equipment

There is a good chance that many of the above activities are already happening in your club. If thinking about safety shifts from being a stand-alone topic to just being a part of how things are done, positive results will be shared by all. For more information on striking up a safety committee, or how to locate resources on safety topics that apply to your club, contact your Regional 4-H Specialist or a Farm Safety Coordinator with the Alberta Farm Safety Program.



The HayEast Challenge

The Bluffton West 4-H Beef Club donated \$1,000 to HayEast 2012, a program to help Ontario beef producers who experienced severe drought in 2012. The Bluffton West 4-H Beef Club challenged other 4-H clubs to participate as well. In addition, several Bluffton club families and others in the community also organized a shipment of 122 bales of hay to Ontario in December.

The Delia 4-H Beef Club met Bluffton's challenge and donated \$1,000 to HayEast, and in August 2012, four members of the Delia club travelled to Oxford County to see the drought firsthand. Everyone was talking about the drought and worried about having no hay for winter. A sheep and dairy farm that we visited had to stop milking their sheep because of the drought.

Weighing in on Delia's decision to donate to HayEast were some members and leaders of the Delia 4-H Club, whose family and neighbours were helped out by HayWest in 2002. That year, HayWest donated over 60,000 large bales to 1,000 farm families in Alberta and Saskatchewan. We look forward to hearing the results of HayEast 2012.
