4-H Livestock Handling for Youth **Workshops**

The first year of the 4-H Livestock Handling for Youth Workshops has wrapped up. A total 225 4-H members attended 10 workshops within the seven regions across Alberta.

These workshops are cosponsored by the Alberta Livestock Industry Development Fund, 4-H Branch of Alberta Agriculture, Food and Rural Development and Alberta Farm Animal Care (AFAC).

The interactive workshop covers several topics related to livestock handling. Members gain an understanding of general animal behavior and handling (all types of livestock); the effects of stress on livestock and how to prevent it; recognizing ill or injured animals: the safe use of medicine and needles; and human health hazards when working with livestock.

The response from participants is positive: "I learned a lot about other animals like elk, bison, chickens etc. I like it a lot and learned more about cattle" "Excellent course of kids starting to work with animals". "All 4-H member with livestock projects should have to take it once (with their parents)."

Darcy Jackson Memorial Amphitheatre

n February 9, 2005, the Calgary 4-H Region voted to recognize one of its most important and contributing past 4-H members by sponsoring the amphitheatre currently under construction at the Alberta 4-H Centre. This support will complete the outdoor theatre in time for this year's summer camp season and see it named "The Darcy Jackson Memorial Amphitheatre".

Darcy Jackson was a 4-H member-extraordinaire, and a true diamond of the Calgary 4-H Region. He was a 4-H member from 1978 to 1986, and in that time became very well known for his 4-H involvement and achievement. He was a pioneering photography member, and one of the very first member-organizers of 4-H on Parade. He was also a successful public speaker, and attended regional curling and any other social event that would come along. He delivered sessions year after vear at the annual Member/ Leader Workshop in January, and was a recipient of the Calgary Regional Bursaries.

Darcy's greatest achievement and contribution to 4-H would take place at the Alberta 4-H Centre at Battle Lake. Darcy attended the very first LTCS held there in 1984 where he became one of Alberta's best counselors. In a day when most regions ran their own camps, the name Darcy Jackson was requested for all of them. He traveled the province to Elkwater, Moose Lake, Macki-



nicholea and David Thompson, but would always finish the summer where he started – Battle Lake, a place he referred to as his 'home away from home'. Darcy would also become Junior Staff at Club Week and be named First Runner-Up Top Male Camper at Provincial Conservation Camp. A true favorite at Selections 1986, he was awarded his #1 choice trip – Northwest Territories.

His departure from being a member of 4-H morphed into a long and beneficial volunteer career with 4-H. He judged public speaking and presentations across the province, and did workshop upon workshop for communications, executive positions and effective meetings. He was an active member of the Calgary 4-H Region Alumni, and became a fixture at communications festivals and Way With Words weekends. 4-H members always loved knowing Darcy was there because it meant two things: they would be safe and they would have fun.

In 1987, Darcy was hired as a Provincial 4-H Summer Staff. He went from being one of the most popular and sought-after counselors to the most popular and sought-after camp staff member. He worked very hard to assure that 4-H members around Alberta had a memorable trip to camp, and was instrumental in developing the PDP program, an event he was passionate would fill a void for 4-H members too old for camp but not quite old enough to attend LTCS or Club Week.

Darcy worked as camp staff for two years before retiring to undertake a project with College Pro Painters in his last summer as an undergraduate student at the University of Calgary. Darcy was in the Faculty of Commerce, and his entrepreneurial spirit led him to take on the oft-advertised curb-painting summer business competition. His efforts in the summer of 1990 resulted in a record set for the most revenue ever accumulated by a curb-painter in the City of Calgary to that point. His secret? A crew of enthusiastic young painters made up of Calgary Region 4-H members he had staffed at camp. Even his first great business triumph utilized his considerable 4-H background.

Darcy graduated from the University of Calgary in 1991, and began a business career with Proctor & Gamble that led him to Toronto. Darcy began experiencing health problems in 2000, and he left us on Sunday, October 24, 2004.

As a result of his longstanding commitment to 4-H in the Calgary Region, and the fact he 'waved his flag' of 4-H friendship as a constant in his life to the very end, the Calgary 4-H Region will

mark his life permanently. The perfect location to do this is the Alberta 4-H Centre at Battle Lake, a place where Darcy spent so much time and influenced so many young lives. He was there when it was christened in 1984, was part of the first camp to sleep in the dorms in 1986, and was around for so many other milestones.

The Amphitheatre at the Alberta 4-H Centre is a perfect monument to mark Darcy's contribution. It is a great opportunity for the Calgary Region to celebrate one of its brightest lights, while positively impacting 4-H members and site-users.

Darcy was the type of person that guys wanted to hang with and girls wanted to cuddle. He was a best friend to everyone and a true 4-H Ambassador. Everyone who knew him loved him. Ultimately, as big as his heart was, it was not big enough to sustain such a huge life and giving personality. The Calgary 4-H Region must be commended for marking his contributions to 4-H. A dedication ceremony will take place during the Time Capsule Opening celebrations, September 2-5, 2005.

This years sheep show has added demonstrations, craft and poster classes. The goat show this year has a chili cook-off and other demonstrations planned. Members can register for these events at the show office at the program.

The new Tractor Rodeo promises to be a highlight of the 2005 event. On Saturday and Sunday, youth and adults will negotiate a course with lawn tractors. Four 'Play it Safe' Sessions involving hands on activities and games related to safety will also take place.

Members attending the program have the choice of 17 life skills workshops. Some are just for members registered in life skills projects, and others are open to all members. Sessions will cover everything from munching on masterpieces to craft projects using thread, stamps, clay and paint. The Musical Ride on June 30 has several mounted drills performed by horse project clubs; the Talent Show has solo and group performances in vocal, instrument and variety categories; and the Lip Sync, a feature since the start of Focus on 4-H, will continue to draw big crowds as over 25 clubs act, sing and dance.

Northwest Judging

he Northwest 4-H Regional Judging Competition is set for April 23 at Lewis Farms near Spruce Grove. The organizing committee has lined up 10 classes to test members' skills. There will be some variety introduced to the livestock classes. One of the livestock classes will be a pick and cull class, where eight animals will be presented and the judge is to choose the top four. Another livestock class will be based on pictures and a scenario, rather than live animals. The variety classes include hay, faba beans, winter boots, craft and mystery class. This year, there will be all oral reasons and no written reasons. Sponsors of the competition are TransAlta Utilities, Capital City Savings and Lewis Farms.

The second judging competition in the Northwest Region is held the first day of Focus on 4-H. It features eight livestock and consumer choice classes. Farm Credit Canada (FCC) is the sponsor of this event.

ocus on Safety is to provide inactive, educational, hands on activities that teach and reinforce safety for the general public including the 4-H members and their families who attend Focus on 4-H, July 2-3, 2005 at Northlands Park.

Injuries have a staggering impact on the physical, social, emotional health and well being of Albertans. Whether fatal or non-fatal, they inflict enormous personal suffering and burdens on the injured, their families and friends, their communities and ultimately society as a whole. They also result in tremendous financial and productivity costs.

There are four components to this event: 1) The Yee-Haa Tractor Rodeo, 2) Draw for Safety, 3) Safety Trade Show, and 4) Play it Safe sessions

Yee-Haa Tractor Rodeo

Tractors are involved in a high percentage of agricultural injuries and deaths. A tractor rodeo is a great way to communicate the importance of safety.

During the rodeo, participants perform common equipment operations, such as driving tractors or hooking and unhooking equipment. The Yee-Haa Tractor Rodeo will test precision,

safety awareness, and attention to detail. There is no time element as rushing to accomplish tasks is the source of many injuries.

The entry fee for each class in the Yee-Haa Tractor Rodeo is \$5 per class. The classes include:

- 900 Junior member female

- 902 Intermediate member female
- 903 Intermediate member male
- 904 Senior member female
- 905 Senior member male
- 906 Leader female
- 907 Leader male
- 908 Team (3 members and 1 leader from the same club)

All participants will receive a Focus on Safety T-shirt and the winners will receive cash prizes. Due to insurance purposes only registered 4-H members and leaders can participate in the Yee-Haa Tractor Rodeo.

FCC First Aid on the Farm

arm Credit Canada (FCC) is partnering with Alberta 4-H to deliver 'First Aid on the Farm', a program developed by St. John's Ambulance for youth in grade 8 (12-14 years of age).

The program is approximately 6.5 hours in duration and covers basic life-saving and first aid skills. Special emphasis will be place on: 1) recognizing hazards on the farm, and 2) administering first aid in situations where EMS is not immediately available.

First Aid on the Farm' will be administered by a St. John's certified instructors and will cover: emergency scene management; shock, unconsciousness and fainting; choking; artificial respiration; wounds and bleeding; burns; poisons; eye injuries; head, spinal and pelvic injuries; cardiovascular injuries; and preparation for emergencies. Participants will also be supplied with a booklet to complete a farm audit, so that hazards may be recognized, making the farm a safer place.

Three courses will be offered in each of the four FCC geographic districts throughout Alberta.

UFA Achievement Day Support Program

U nited Farmers of Alberta (UFA) has once again shown its outstanding commitment to Alberta 4-H.

Achievement day committees can apply for a grant of \$100 per club, to promote and enhance their achievement day event. Clubs that market together are encouraged to leverage their allotment by pooling resources. Funds can be used to promote the sale, provide meals or refreshment for the event participants or maximize existing marketing protocols that cooperating clubs have developed.

After the event, achievement day organizing committees are asked to submit a report to the 4-H Foundation of Alberta, outlining how they used the funds. The club(s) that had the most creative, effective, and/or most unique idea will have their funding doubled the next year.

This \$42,500 enhancement will replace UFA's purchase of 4-H marketable livestock at achievement day sales. UFA's total support to 4-H has surpassed the \$175,000 mark, and equates to an average of approximately \$16 for every member and leader involved in the Alberta 4-H program.

Insurance – When are our Members, Leaders and Volunteers Covered?

The Alberta 4-H Council, on behalf of 4-H members, leaders and volunteers purchases three insurance policies. These policies are in place to ensure your protection while involved in club, district, regional and provincial activities.

The three insurances, Commercial General Liability, Accident, and Directors and Officers Liability are each unique in their purpose, but together provide us all with the needed insurance protection should an unforeseen incident/accident happen.

Your responsibilities regarding the insurance are simple.

- All members and leaders who are registered through the club registration system are considered registered members and leaders. If you need to add a member or leader part way through the year, you must submit the information to the 4-H Registrar as soon as possible. Fees for members and screening information for leaders are due at the same time. An unregistered member or leader is not covered by the insurances.
- 2) Activities and events that your club participates in must be recorded on a calendar of events, program outline, information letter to parents, or in the clubs minutes. If your club chooses to participate in any event ski trip/ livestock show/ bingo social/ farm tour etc. the event and the registered 4-H participants will be covered by insurance.
- 3) We recognize that, on occasion, you may use volunteers who are not registered leaders. These volunteers would assist with one or perhaps two activities throughout the club year. Provided that these volunteers' names appear on a program, in the club minutes, or in a committee report submitted prior to the activity, these volunteers are also covered by the insurance.
- 4) Siblings, friends, and outside participants in an event are not covered by the 4-H insurance policies.
- 5) In the event of an incident involving injury, damage to property, or threatened legal action, please contact the 4-H Branch as soon as possible so we can assist you in providing adequate information and detail to the insurance companies.

News/Events. This is you will find our Calendar, Press Releases, Contests and Special Offers.

Interactive Online. Of special interest to Leaders – Level One Training Leaders Quiz.

Contact Us. You have to check out the Club Finder. A map of Alberta that you can select which region you are interested in. This takes you to information about where 4-H clubs are located in each region. The staff listing provides you with contact information for the Alberta 4-H Branch staff.

Profile: Lac La Biche 4-H Club

What do you get when you mix six eager 4-H members with a roll of fishing line and some branches? Well, it's the Creative Options Fishing and Outdoors projects.

Last year, the Lac La Biche 4-H Multi Club started a fishing project as part of creative options. With material gained from attending the Western Regional Leaders' Forum in Alaska, Bryan Kumpula, 4-H Leader began working with the interested members of his club.

Over the course of the year, members learned about fish genetics, types of fish, casting, fly fishing, spawning techniques and how to test the oxygen levels of lakes. Members went fishing at Winifred Lake, commercial fishing at Lac La Biche, and completed a fish and wild-life study.

With vast knowledge about fishing under their belt, the appropriate next step was to begin the Outdoorsman project, where members are learning to build shelters and campfires, tie knots, take part in fishing and camping trips, and survive the winter.

Keeping with the 4-H motto of 'Learn to do by Doing', members are putting their skills to the test. Recently, members built quinsy's (which look and act much like an igloo) and stayed in them one night while ice fishing in the midst of our cold Alberta winter. According to Craig Kumpula, project member, "It was a lot of fun, and surprisingly, only one candle is needed to heat the quinsy or it becomes too hot." In addition to stating his excitement about the project, Craig looks forward to learning about archery, snaring, building lean-twos and surviving outdoors later this year.

38 members of the Lac La Biche Club take part in crafts, beef, horse, llama and alpaca, canine, photography and veterinary science projects. The outdoorsman project was added in response to interest shown by a few of the club's members.




