



Held bi-annually, PELF provides an educational opportunity for leaders across Alberta and Saskatchewan to broaden their knowledge of available equine projects, exchange practical solutions and learn new skills. Leaders were challenged to network, teach and spread the knowledge that was garnered during the weekend, in their communities and clubs.

Training sessions included: Horsemanship, Equine Massage and Chiropractic, Alexander Technique, Bits and Bitting, Hoof Care, Equine Health Management, Starting a Horse, Hosting a Rodeo, The Working Cow Horse, Equine Record Books, Saddle Fitting, Tack Cleaning and Care, Branding and Advertising, Cutting and Team Penning, The Horse Industry, Saddle Fitting, and Working with the 4-H Judge.



## Focus on 4-H

The 8<sup>th</sup> annual Focus on 4-H program introduces new interactive activities for all members. Some of the highlights for this year's event, July 1 to 3 at Northlands Park, are as follows:

### Judging

Always popular with members in the livestock projects, this competition aims to include all 4-H members. Therefore, this year, the majority of the classes involve consumer decision-making. In these classes, members will rank classes such as boots, food or lawn tractors. No other event is scheduled at the same time to allow as many members as possible to take part. It starts at 10:00 am on July 1.

### 4-H Face off

Is an action packed fivestage race starting at 3:30 on July 1. In teams, members will be solving a mystery and having loads of fun doing it. It's a chance for members to mix and meet others.

### **Presentations Competition**

This new event aims to give members the opportunity to promote an Alberta Grown Product. Scheduled for July 3, all 4-H members attending can enter. It is an open competition completely separate from any placings at a 4-H presentation competition previously held in 2006. There are significant prizes for the top three presenters.

### Play it Safe

After the success of the Play it Safe activities last year, the Bike and Tractor Rodeos will be held on July 3. Members and adults will be negotiating a course with lawn tractors. Junior members will be riding bicycles.

### **Project Shows**

Project shows continue to be a big part of Focus on 4-H. Members registered in horse, beef, lifeskills, canine, sheep and goat all have events to enter. Displays of other projects are encouraged. The interactive showmanship classes enable members to learn about showing other project species.

The Horse Show draws the majority of horse project members in the Northwest Region. Members will be happy to learn their horses will again be stabled in Hall C so they will be close to the show rings in Halls C and D. After an evening of fun with the stationary roping, musical rides and decorating the box stalls, members will be kept busy showing their skills in English, western, trail and gymkhana classes.

The Beef Show contains grooming, freshman, conformation and showmanship classes. New this year are the beef marketing classes where members get to demonstrate their communication skills.

*The Canine Show* has been revamped to greater reflect the ages of the members and the skills of all the dogs par-

ticipating in the agility and obedience trials. There will be demonstrations on scent, hurdle racing and stunt agility, as well as canine costume classes.

The combined Sheep and Goat Show offers a variety of classes to enable the members to showcase their different project animals.

Members attending the program have the choice of 14 Life Skills Workshops to learn about crafts, carpentry, kitchen skills and personal care. Most require preregistration but participants can also "drop in" two times during the program and make the crafts of the day for a nominal fee.

The evenings at Focus on 4-H are talent filled with the Lip Sync and Talent Shows. Come meet your friends at Focus on 4-H 2006. Clubs from the Northwest region were sent information packages. 

## National Volunteer Conference



## CAPL Contributes to the 4-H Legacy Fund

In keeping with the 2006 Canadian Association of Petroleum Landmen (CAPL) calendar theme - Commitment to Community, Rob Telford, CAPL Director of Public Relations, presented a cheque for \$8,000 to the 4-H Foundation of Alberta at the December 7, 2005 CAPL General Meeting.

Bruce Banks, Executive Director of the 4-H Foundation of Alberta, accepted the donation on behalf of 4-H with many thanks to the CAPL Board of Directors and the Public Relations Committee for their dedication to the sale of nearly 800 raffle tickets in support of 4-H. The tickets were sold for two half sides of beef in conjunction with CAPL sponsorship of the Reverse Steer at the 2005 Calgary Stampede Steer Auction.

The monies raised by the CAPL will be channeled towards the 4-H Legacy Fund, which provides grant funding to 4-H groups for initiatives such as fundraising for new club startups, new unique programs, project workshops, capital projects, club exchanges and leader development.

One of the mandates of the CAPL is to pursue and strengthen positive interaction within the communities and with the stakeholders with whom we deal on a daily basis. Through our newly created association with 4-H, the benefits are farreaching. We are not only assisting the development of our youth by providing funds for their personal growth, community awareness, and environmental responsibility, but are also enabling the CAPL to gain recognition as a focal point for providing information, education and Q&A to the rural community as we move towards the Surface Land Agents Certification program.

In 2006, the CAPL Public Relations Committee plans to continue the affirmative inroads with the 4-H Foundation. The generous individual contributions of our members, associates and member companies who helped to make our 2005 fundraiser a success should take pride in the fact that, as an association, our commitment to community will benefit all of us and our stakeholders as we move into the future.

## **4-H Scholarship Program**

Are you a past or present 4-H member who will be attending a college or university in the fall? If so, you definitely need to apply to the Provincial 4-H Scholarship Program.

4-H will be awarding over 110 provincial scholarships as well as more than 30 regional scholarships and bursaries.

Thanks to the generous support of sponsors, members will receive scholarships (ranging from \$200 to \$1500). Most scholarships are awarded based on community and 4-H involvement, with no preference to a program of study. Last year, more than half of the applicants received a scholarship.

The application process is easy, especially if you've applied before. You've already done all the work by being involved in 4-H and your community, so why not apply to get your hands on some much needed education funding. Past and present 4-H members that apply will be considered for all scholarships that they are eligible for. Past scholarship recipients are also eligible.

## New Grants for Clubs, Districts and Regions

Alberta 4-H is blessed with a strong and vibrant sponsorship base. Our supporters help fund 4-H programming from club to the provincial level. Supporters include government agencies, corporations and private individuals. Through three new sponsorships, Alberta 4-H is pleased to offer club and council grants that will help fund such things as member and leader training and community activities. The grant process to obtain funding for your clubs activities is very simple and requires only a matter of minutes to complete.

The new grant and sponsor initiatives are as follows:

### AltaLink Club and Community Support Sponsorship Program

AltaLink supports all levels of the 4-H program. At the club level, AltaLink will provide **\$50** to clubs applying from AltaLink's service area. Clubs are encouraged to apply for this sponsorship to enhance club programming and/or influence their communities. Clubs are also encouraged to invite AltaLink employees to attend the events supported.

At the district and regional level, AltaLink will provide **\$200** per council to assist the councils in conducting their annual public speaking and/or presentations competitions. Councils are encouraged to apply for this sponsorship to enhance the contest event to showcase the 4-H talent in our communities. 4-H Councils are requested to invite AltaLink employees to attend and participate (bring greetings, act as tellers or timers, etc) in the competitions supported.

The deadline for submitting an application for the AltaLink programs is 60 days prior to the actual event.

AltaLink has committed to an overall yearly support of \$202,500 over the next three years to Alberta 4-H. Provincial support is directed to Alberta 4-H Leaders' Conference, Club Week, Camps and People Developing People.



### Canada Safeway 4-H Club Future Building

Canada Safeway and Alberta 4-H believe that 4-H clubs are member oriented and volunteer driven - focusing on the development of young people in rural communities. Promotion, retention of 4-H members, and training of leaders is critical to the viability of Alberta 4-H. Starting in 2006 Canada Safeway will support Alberta 4-H Clubs for up to **\$250** per club per year. Safeway also joins the sponsor team for the Alberta 4-H Awards of Excellence.

Core 4-H programming areas for this grant are: 1) member recruitment campaigns (including strategies such as ads in local papers, posters, and community awareness participation), 2) Member Leader-



ship Training. Clubs are able to allocate funds for club members to attend regional and provincial 4-H leadership training events, and 3) Volunteer Leader Training. Clubs allocate support funds for their volunteer leaders to attend regional and provincial 4-H leadership training events.

Canada Safeway has committed \$350,000 to this initiative over the next three years. Clubs in Safeway areas also have an opportunity to work with local stores.

### EnCana 4-H Community Builder Fund

EnCana and Alberta 4-H believe that 4-H organizations are key participants in their communities. EnCana is focused on contributing to the strength and sustainability of the communities in which they are privileged to operate. 4-H clubs, districts or regions are challenged to expand their impact and horizons by creating unique projects or programs that will enhance their communities. This is a matching sponsorship grant in which 4-H organizations can apply for up to **\$1,000** in matching funds (E.g. club spends \$500 towards a \$1,000 initiative, and EnCana will contribute the other \$500) from an annual pool of \$40,000. Additional consideration may be given, for unique ground breaking proposals.

Some examples include: personal development seminars or tours, project skill workshops or competitions, hosting activity based 4-H promotional fun days, hosting or conducting community charitable events, and new unique endeavours.

EnCana has committed a minimum support to Alberta of \$360,000 to Alberta 4-H over the next three years. Provincially support is directed to Alberta 4-H Leaders' Conference, Provincial 4-H Senior Members' Conference and Provincial 4-H Club Week.

Local EnCana staff are willing to act as volunteers or resource instructors for your projects.

## **4-H Volunteer** Hall of Fame

### **Description of the Program**

Created in 1971, the 4-H Volunteer Hall of Fame recognizes volunteers who significantly contribute to Alberta's rural youth and agriculture. Inductees demonstrate outstanding leadership in the program promoting the 4-H motto of 'Learn to do by Doing', and live out the 4-H pledge of service and commitment to club, community and country through all activities and levels of the organization.

### Who Can Be Nominated?

Nominees must have demonstrated significant leadership and initiative, and have positively impacted 4-H at the local, district, regional and provincial levels. The selection committee will also consider the individual's involvement in other community organizations. Only people outside the candidate's immediate family may nominate an individual to the 4-H Hall of Fame.

Beef Breed associations offer products or prizes on a yearly basis to 4-H clubs. The Provincial 4-H Office, as a service, provides this information to you. When contacting a breed representative, please allow enough time for the shipment of product or prizes (if you are awarding these at your awards night).

### What is each beef breed association offering?

Information provided by beef breed associations is available on the Alberta 4-H website (www.4h.ab.ca) under the heading 'Applications/Forms'.

The following information can be found on the beef breeds webpage:

- Links to the Beef Product and Breed Association applications. Fill out these forms for each association and send it directly to the beef breed association(s). Please supply all necessary information as requested.
- A listing of each beef breed association. Access information provided by the beef breed association, including, if available, a link to the association's web site.
- Links to other documents of interest, such as:
  - Livestock slaughter and process in Alberta Agriculture
  - Approved government courier office listing
  - How to buy your beef tags from Ketchum and support Alberta 4-H

4-H Leaders may apply for as many awards as applicable for their clubs.

### How do you get your awards?

When you, the 4-H Leader, request awards, a specific courier location must be given for delivery. The courier office will call you when the awards come in. Please ensure that these awards are picked up promptly after receiving notification.

## **Grant Procedures**

### **BY HENRY WIEGMAN**

Alberta 4-H employs three types of granting procedures for clubs and councils: 1) sponsorship grants, 2) matching sponsorship grants and 3) government grants. Any grant requires due diligence, in which sponsors want to see the activities clubs/councils partake in. The information usually required to access funds is the club/council name, event name, date, and contact information to send funds.

### Sponsorship Grants

To be eligible for future funding, clubs/councils must:

- Send a brief report (50 words or less) on how the funds were used
- Indicate in the report how many 4-H members, leaders and community members were impacted
- Indicate how your organization involved sponsor representatives – I.e. if they were invited!
- Submit samples of sponsorship recognition (I.e. pictures of the sponsor banner, the event program, etc.)
- Show evidence of thank you correspondence sent to the sponsor
- Submit a report within 60 days following the event

All of the above requirements are what clubs normally do, or should do, for local supporters. Therefore, the grant process is very simple and requires little additional work. If you have older members or eager volunteers in your club, assign them some of the above responsibilities.

### Matching Sponsorship Grants

Traditionally matching grants are not used unless the amount that is available is above \$500 per club. In addition to the requirements of sponsorship grants, clubs/ councils must also supply (before the date of the event):

- Event or project description (150 words or less)
- Event date
- An outline on how sponsors will be involved
- A project budget
- Total amount requested, and an acknowledgement on the ability to proceed if funds are denied in part

### AAFRD 4-H Council Sponsorship Grants

Provides \$200 per district council and \$1,000 per regional council. To apply for the funds, organizations must supply:

- Upcoming 4-H year budget
- List of Council executive with contact information
- Council's program plan
- Signed financial statement from previous year

### Outdoors Project Gains Popularity



## A Reflection of You

When you look in the mirror, what do you notice? Let's say you catch a look at yourself a half dozen times a day, opening a door, closing the microwave or washing your hands - each time, making an adjustment to your appearance. This fine-tuning helps maintain your self-image. And if these reflections not only revealed your fashion sense, but your leadership ability, what would be reflected?

Making that conscious check is referred to as self-awareness. The challenge in developing your awareness and leadership ability is getting the feedback you need at the right time, being about to see yourself in the mirror.

When it comes to immediate feedback, horses are one of the best teachers. A horse is acutely perceptive, brutally honest and has no hidden agenda. Like all social species, a herd animal looks for a leader. Their communica-



tion is non-verbal – the horse's ears, eyes and body language will tell a lot about what they are thinking. If we begin to recognize the impact of our non-verbal cues on a horse, it becomes easier to understand and recognize the importance of non-verbal communication in our dialogue with people.

Take the simple task of leading a horse. How you lead a horse says more about you than the horse. If your approach suggests fear or no control – the horse will assume the lead. If your emotions get in the way and you become aggressive you might coerce the horse to follow, but out of fear not respect. To get the horse in step you have to recognize the process is as important as the destination.

A natural leader, the horse is also a natural follower. As you gain confidence and clarity through experience and reflection the horse will mirror those efforts, it is this ability that makes them a perfect tool for self-assessment. The beauty of horses is in the subtlety they teach us to embrace.

If the horse is your mirror, what reflection do you see?

## **Club Registrations**

This year, the 4-H Branch has worked very hard to ensure that club registrations and orders were completed quickly and accurately so that clubs received information as soon as possible. We need your help to ensure that we can continue to efficiently provide this service. Below are a few common errors that consume a lot of time when processing your club registrations and order forms:

- Missing information for leaders and members. Please include birth dates, addresses, postal codes, phone numbers, and project codes for each member and leader
- Missing information for clubs. Please include project codes the club is offering in the current year, date the club started in the current year, and signature of the general leader on the screening and approval portion of the club registration form
- Amount of the registration fee is not equal to the number of members in club times \$30. Please count the members carefully, keeping in mind that the fee amount is \$30 per member
- Not sending in the hard copy of last year's club leaders and members with changes made. Members not returning should be crossed out (not blacked or whited out), and the projects and responsibilities should be changed by crossing out last year's information and printing this years
- New members and leaders added on last year's printout or other pieces of paper and not on new member and new leader forms provided
- Sending in the club supply order form without the club registration form and fees. Please keep in mind that your club supply order will not be processed until all your information is correct
- Faxing club supply order forms and/or club registration forms and then sending the registration fees by mail.
   Please note that we will not process either without the registration fees

We are currently working to ensure the club registration form is as user-friendly as possible, so if we can work together this upcoming year to reduce the common errors listed above, hopefully all registrations and orders will be processed in a timely manner. Thank you for your help.

Please Note: Registering your club early will also ensure your new club members receive the December issue of the 4-H Magazine.

### **Cleaver Mascot and Display Bookings**



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## Tips for Completing a Club Supply Order Form

Below are a few tips to help you with your Club Supply Order form. We have made revisions to the order form for the upcoming year to make it more user friendly.

### Fill out the form carefully:

- Use the new form that we will be developing for the Fall of 2006.
- Read the descriptions and ordering recommendations of each item while ordering. Details are at the beginning of the catalogue.

### Don't Over Order:


- Only order what is needed for the upcoming club year. Ordering extra leads to stock-outs and backorders. In addition, this will ensure you have the most up-to-date materials from year to year.
- Only one copy of the record book should be ordered for each project a member is in. If they want a second copy to use as a rough draft, they should photocopy the original or print a copy off the web site.
- Member and Leader Reference Manuals (Horse Reference Book, Canine Member Guide, Sheep Production Manual, Beef Levels) only need to be ordered once for a member. Members and Leaders should be keeping their manuals from one year to the next unless there is a new edition or if they are moving up a level. If revisions are extensive enough, it will be noted beside the item if it is "new".
- For leaders ordering more than is needed for a "normal" club situation, please provide justification in the comment lines at the bottom of the pages on the new order form. If you would like to just look at a lot of new project resources, try the following options first before ordering: Look on the resource link on the website (username is alberta4h and password is cleaver); Borrow a copy from your 4-H Specialist and return when finished, or; Order a copy and return if it is not something that you are going to pursue right away.

### **Ribbons:**

Get help from your key leader, a veteran leader or a 4-H Specialist to calculate your ribbon requirements so that you are not over or under ordering. Once you have received some assistance, it should be easier to order them from year to year.

 Ribbons should only be ordered for club achievement days. If you are hosting an interclub, district or regional event, you should be purchasing your own ribbons through your own suppliers.

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
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# Fundraising


