As the leader of a 4-H club, I want to make sure all my members apply for the Alberta 4-H Awards of Excellence. What is required of the members in order to apply for these awards and how do I go about ordering them?

Congratulations on wanting your members to receive their Awards of Excellence. For members to receive their awards, they must complete a Yearly 4-H Diary every year and submit it to the leader from your club responsible for marking diaries. When checking diaries, the leader should check to make sure that the member participated in the events they indicated and that they have not missed any activities, sign each diary to indicate that it is correct, and keep a record of the number of points for each member. After all diaries are marked from the previous year, obtain an "Award of Excellence" order form either from your club contact or the 4-H website (www.4h.ab.ca). Then, check the points for each of the members in your club. If any of them just reached 90, 150, 220, or 320, order the correct type of medallion, either bronze, silver, gold or platinum. Send the order form in to your Regional 4-H Office and contact the Award of Excellence sponsors to make the presentation to your members at your club's awards event.

Julie Ulseth - Provincial 4-H Alumni Coordinator

I plan to move to Lethbridge next year to attend University, but want to stay in touch with all my 4-H friends. Is this possible if I join the 4-H Alumni?

Most definitely! The goal of the alumni is to keep former, new and current 4-H members, who are 18 and older, connected to existing friends, new friends and the rest of the 4-H family. 

Standardbred Project Received a 10 out of 10


BY 4-H MEMBERS IN THE STANDARDBRED PROJECT

Being Prepared for a Meeting

It's more than just grabbing your jacket and heading out of the door. The more time you spend preparing for your District Council meeting (or any meeting for that matter!), the more productive the meeting will be. There are several things you can do before the meeting:

- 1. Talk to your club before the District Council meeting. You will want to gather information on the issues or ideas that were presented at the last District Council meeting. Prepare your written report to be handed into the council secretary.
- 2. Take time to read the agenda. Make notes about the topics you wish to speak about or to.
- 3. Take time to read the minutes of the last meeting. Write down any comments or questions that you have on what was discussed at the last meeting. Follow up on anything you agreed to do from the last meeting. Note any discrepancies in the minutes and be prepared to correct it at the meeting.
- 4. Bring paper or notebook and a pen to write down information.
- 5. If you sit on a committee and are making a report to the meeting, bring a written copy to submit to the secretary. Remember to keep a copy of your report to refer to during the discussion.
- 6. Arrive at the meeting location early:
- Pick up and review any reports that are available at the meeting.
- Settle into your meeting space coat hung up, meeting items ready, etc.
- Turn off cell phones and pagers.
- 7. Be ready to participate fully at the District Council Meeting.
- Actively participate in the meeting by listening attentively, keeping an open mind, and offering meaningful input.
- Encourage the participation of others, and respect their views.
- Volunteer to take on responsibility in areas that you can contribute.

4-H in Ukraine

From September 29 through to October 14 I had the opportunity to travel to Ukraine as part of a project to introduce a 4-H program in four Oblasts (provinces) in the country. The prairie province's 4-H programs are cooperating under the FARM program (Facility for Agricultural Reform and Modernization) to encourage 4-H and youth leadership development.

In Kyiv on October 2 and 3rd I presented a workshop to newly hired 4-H staff, extension specialists and leaders and school principals. This workshop provided an opportunity for sharing how Alberta 4-H operates and identifying the different components of the program. The participants had the opportunity to then do some planning for each of their oblasts.

The schools in the villages offer after school activities for the students. In most cases the 4-H clubs formed are existing clubs converted into 4-H clubs. The teachers are often the leaders of the clubs. Some have started as recently as September. They meet to do their project work one to three times per week. Most of the clubs have 12 to 30 members.

Volyn Oblast in northwest Ukraine has three communities with 4-H clubs. The Myl's'k village clubs have vegetable gardening, flowers plants and trees, and an embroidery project. Those interested in marketing vegetables, flowers and seeds have support from the FARM extension program with seeds, seedlings and technical help in growing their horticulture projects. In Topil'no village they are concentrating on beadwork projects while in Kopachivka many examples of straw pictures and embroidery were displayed.

Rivne Oblast, the next province to the east of Volyn had two clubs started, one in the village of Derazhne in Kostopilsky rayon (region) and the other in the town of Kvasyliv. Their projects include beadwork, painting, straw creations, embroidery and nature crafts. The members spoke about their projects, their club's activities and are most interested in learning about the Canadian 4-H clubs through letters between 4-H members.


Dnipropetrovsk Oblast in the south part of Ukraine, has two very active clubs. In the village of Debalzeve in the Vasylkivsky rayon, they have a 'green' school where horticulture, plants, a healthy environment and cleaning up their village are emphasized. The two projects in the club are floral art and green-scape. They have many plans to add embroidery, knitting, baking and other projects to their club. In the village of Katerynivka, in Pokrovsky rayon, the projects include embroidery, dough art and bead work.

Sumy Oblast in Northeast Ukraine started with two clubs in September. At the first club is in the village of Vorozhba in the Lebedin rayon 4-H members showed me their embroidery, knitting and crochet projects. In the neighbouring village of Ryabushku the 18 members in the club are aiming to improve their school orchard, leadership and dancing skills.

The 4-H Members in Ukraine would really like to connect with Canadian 4-H clubs. Most of the 4-H members are in grades 5, 6 and 7. They hope to learn about clubs in Canada, how clubs with similar interests operate and gain a greater understanding of the 4-H program goals. A Scary Day for Local Horse Club






Big Hill West 4-H Light Horse Club

4-H Experience Turns into an Experience of a Lifetime

Much like eating your vegetables, being a member of 4-H is good for you. It opens doors, imparts skills and introduces you to the possibilities that exist within the hobby, the lifestyle or the interest that you are currently pursuing with your 4-H club. What started out as a 10-year 4-H career as a member with the Usona 4-H Dairy Club has translated into worldwide opportunities for travel for Rimbey dairy farmer, Markus Helhi.

To say that Markus has remained active in the dairy industry since his 4-H stint ended would be an understatement. He has been to various shows and expos in Utah, Idaho and British Columbia, grooming and preparing the cattle for their respective shows. The beginning of October saw him at the World Dairy Expo in Madison, Wisconsin, to only return home and attend the Westerner Championship Dairy Showcase in Red Deer, which is where I finally caught up with him.

Trust me—this is not an easy guy to get a hold of but with his having been to Switzerland twice, and being on his way to the southern hemisphere in the new year, it makes sense. Markus has been chosen to represent Canada in the 2007 Canada/Australia-New Zealand Young Adult Exchange Program.

"I will arrive in Australia for their International Dairy Week and then spend the next month travelling around the country, working on various dairy farms," Markus comments. "I do basically the same tour in New Zealand for what will end up being a three month trip in total. Ultimately I will be promoting Canada and its dairy industry all the while learning about their industry and developments."

While this will be an awesome experience, it required quite an involved application process. "In the preliminary round, applicants have to submit a short write-up that explains your background and experiences, as well as your resume and a one-page essay that addresses what the applicants think about the future of dairy farming in this country." At this stage in the process, there have typically been about 15-20 people who have applied.

"It is narrowed down to 6 applicants based on our essays and resume and these six have to do a conference call interview with a panel of 2-3 judges, who then select the winner." Considering Markus's long list of accomplishments and skills showmanship, judging, public speaking, leadership, and a member of the 1999 4-H team that competed in the National 4-H Judging Competition at the World Dairy Expo—all of which he achieved while obtaining his of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture with a major in Animal Science, he is a wellsuited representative. "A lot of what qualified me for this exchange were the experiences and the knowledge that having been a 4-H member provided me with. Being apart of 4-H gave me my base, and I have just proceeded to build on it." And build on it he certainly has, with having won various scholarships, awards, trips, and recognition. Markus has truly been making the most out of his 4-H experience.

It's a Zoo in Here!

4-H Entrepreneurs Turn a Project Into a Business

Ever see something and think, "I should do that"? Ten years ago, that exact thought flitted through the minds of past 4- H members Theresa and Manda Maggs. Instead of just thinking about it, they put their idea into action. "We actually had the idea before we knew about the 4-H Business Cents project. We would always go to fairs when we were young and would end up spending hours at the petting zoo. We noticed though, that the petting zoos were only ever at the big fairs, and so we decided to make one for the smaller fairs," remembers Theresa.

But what started as being a smaller scale, turned into a fiveyear long, almost every weekend spoken for, type of commitment, to the extent that one Canada Day had three bookings. In 1996, at ages 15 and 12 respectively, Theresa and Amanda penned a letter to the town of Grimshaw, AB, asking if they could use the empty lot that faced the highway and therefore got a ton of drive-by traffic and visibility. "We had a pretty basic stock of animals then," comments Theresa. "That afternoon, we had an open house of sorts, giving out homemade business cards and information brochures and pony rides." The same day, Grimshaw's vet approached the two sisters, wanting to know if they could work the following weekend and the rest writes itself.

The year that "Dreams Can Come True Ponies and Pets Traveling Zoo" launched coincided perfectly with Theresa and Manda's club, the Berwyn 4-H Multi Cover-alls' starting the Business Cents 4-H project. "We only ever had to take out one \$1000 loan, which we used to buy panels to divide the animals with," remembers Theresa. In the first year of Theresa and Mandas' petting zoo, it really was just the bare bones. Their family had the ponies that were necessary for the rides, but for the most part, the Maggs sister's realized that to make money, you have to spend money. First, a baby goat and lamb were purchased. "The following year, we bought female goats and lambs so that we would have baby animals every summer because they are always so popular." The Business Cents project is still in existence today. Mary Lundgard and her husband are leaders of the Fairview 4-H Business Club. Mary is very proud of her club, its delegates and how she has seen her members grow into more confident and able individuals. "There is definitely a commerce component to what we do—the older members are in charge of books and accounts, intermediate members study depreciation whereas the younger members are versed in being able to identify an idea that will be market viable. All members however, are responsible for the selling of the product, and it is in this part of the project that I think there is the most learning and development."

As the Maggs' sisters worked through their 4-H project, they made some beneficial decisions along the way, such as adding a used one-tonne truck and trailer to their fleet and hiring some extra help. Throughout the zoo's life, Theresa and Manda employed over 25 people. "Business Cents was a great project for teaching us how to self market and to run a business. When I was 17, I was hiring people for our shows—we learned very quickly about business and what worked and didn't work."

Mary has had much the same experience with her members. "We had a member who wanted to produce a CD for his band, and while he realized that it wouldn't work because of high costs and distribution issues, it is the fact that he tried it and learnt things along the way, rather than have someone just say "no."


Over 25 employees, 2 potbellied pigs, an acquired llama, a carousel full of ponies, a flurry of ducks, some small rabbits, a gathering of baby goats and lambs, a petting-zoo- goatturned pet named Peggy and one rooster—not a bad collection of animals for a petting zoo that was intended to circulate through some of the smaller fairs in northern Alberta. Moving away for school and busier lives meant that running the business in its current form was no longer an option, but Theresa comments, "If I got the chance, I would do it again for sure. There are many opportunities for youth entrepreneurs, and there are many rewards for having gleaned that sort of knowledge at a young age."
