
Foot and Mouth Disease

Foot and mouth disease (FMD) is a highly contagious and sometimes fatal viral disease of cloven-hoofed animals, including cattle, sheep, goats and pigs. Other species that may be affected include, bison, elk, deer, alpacas, and llamas.



Signs and Symptoms

- Sores, ulcers and blisters on feet, snout, tongue, nose, lips, teats and in the mouth
- Excessive salivation and smacking of lips
- Tender and sore feet with vesicles and ulcers where the hoof joins the skin

Report any unusual signs to your veterinarian immediately.

Biosecurity Measures

- Restrict visitor access to animals, especially those that may have recently travelled overseas
- Record movement of people, animals and equipment on and off farms and ranches
- Isolate new animals and replacements for at least 14 days before introducing them into the herd
- Anyone leaving a farm to attend another farm or an event where livestock are present should, as a matter of routine, ensure that footwear and clothing they wear has been properly cleaned and disinfected prior to departure and prior to returning home
- Ensure staff particularly those hired on a seasonal basis
 are familiar with principles of biosecurity and protocols in place on the farm or ranch
