Agri-Food Statistics Update

Collected from a variety of sources, the Statistics and Data Development Section monitors statistical indicators of agri-food activity for Alberta. The Agri-Food Statistics Update is designed to provide users with commentary on current issues, trends and new developments related to agriculture and the food and beverage processing industries. Up-to-date statistics are supplemented with informative charts and diagrams. To gauge Alberta's performance, comparative data and information are often available for Canada and the provinces.

The estimates present potential marketings (i.e. supply which could become available), based on the size of the breeding herd and imports. Such information is useful to producers and others when making decisions relating to marketings, pricing, future production, as well as in estimating farm income and farm expenses.

The process involves verifying commodity supply and disposition variables to arrive at ending stocks. The supply variables are opening stocks, births and imports (interprovincial/international), while the disposition variables include deaths and condemnations, marketings, and exports (interprovincial/international). Administrative data are used where available, supplemented with some estimates where data are not timely or available. Hence, **the inventory estimates are subject to revision**. Given this limitation, users are advised to exercise some caution when using the estimates.

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January 1, 2016 Livestock Inventory Estimates Alberta/Canada

On March 3, Statistics Canada released the January 1, 2016 inventory estimates for cattle, pigs, and sheep and lamb on farms in Alberta and other Canadian provinces. **Key Messages**

Cattle and Calves Inventories

- ⇒ Cattle and calves on Alberta farms totalled 4.9 million head, up 0.4 per cent from January 1, 2015.
- ⇒ All cattle classes posted gains with the exception of heifers for slaughter and steers due to an increase in animals retained rather than being slaughtered and exported in 2015.

Pig Inventories

- ⇒ Alberta's total pig herd on farms was estimated at 1.5 million head, up 1.7 per cent from a year previous.
- ⇒ Inventories increased for all classes of animals with the exception of market hogs in the "Over 81 kilograms" class.
- ⇒ The major factor encouraging growth in pig inventories was the strong consumer demand for pork.

Sheep and Lamb Inventories

- \Rightarrow The size of the provincial flock on farms was 135,000 head, down 6.9 per cent from a year earlier.
- \Rightarrow Record slaughter lamb and sheep prices in 2015 encouraged marketings.

Other Comparisons

- \Rightarrow Nationally, cattle and calf, and pig inventories were up, while sheep and lamb inventories decreased.
- ⇒ Alberta currently ranks first in the nation in cattle and calf inventories; third in sheep and lamb inventories; and fourth in pig inventories.

Alberta's Cattle and Calf Inventory increased 0.4 per cent

As of January 1, 2016, cattle and calves on Alberta farms totalled 4.9 million head, up 0.4 per cent from January 1, 2015. Inventories grew for all cattle classes with the exception of heifers for slaughter and steers. The marginal increase in cattle and calf inventories was largely due to an increase in the number of animals retained rather than being slaughtered and exported in 2015, when compared to 2014.

Alberta's beef breeding herd, comprising cows and heifers rose 1.3 per cent to 1.8 million head. Total beef cow numbers grew marginally by 0.8 per cent to 1.6 million head, while beef heifers for replacement increased 5.2 per cent to 224,800 head. The small rise in beef cow numbers marks the first year-over-year inventory increase since January 1, 2013, but remains 25.1 per cent below the peak of January 1, 2005 (2.1 million head).

Calves were up 0.9 per cent to 1.7 million head, bulls increased by 1.1 per cent to 90,000 head, while heifers for slaughter fell 0.8 per cent to 575,500 head, and steers decreased 2.3 per cent to 666,000 head. The provincial dairy herd, comprising of milk cows and dairy replacement heifers increased 1.3 per cent to 117,400 head, compared to January 1, 2015.

Alberta's Pig Inventory grew 1.7 per cent

Alberta's total pig herd on farms was estimated at 1.5 million head, up 1.7 per cent from January 1, 2015. Inventories increased for all classes of animals with the exception of market hogs in the "Over 81 kilograms" class. The major factor impacting hog inventories was the strong consumer demand for pork.


The total market hog inventory grew 1.7 per cent to 1.4 million head. Hogs in the "Under 23 kilograms" class rose 4.2 per cent to 501,000 head, while hogs in the "23 to 53 kilogram" class increased 3.1 per cent to 272,200 head. Similarly, hogs in the "54 to 80 kilogram" class were up 0.6 per cent to 306,900 head. Hogs in the "Over 81 kilogram" class declined 2.8 per cent to 282,100 head.

The estimated breeding inventory comprising boars, sows and bred gilts was up 1.8 per cent from January 1, 2015, to 142,800 head. Sows and bred gilts increased 1.8 per cent to 138,400 head, while boars increased 2.3 per cent to 4,400 head.

Alberta's Sheep and Lamb Inventory declined 6.9 per cent


As of January 1, 2016, the size of the provincial sheep and lamb flock on farms was 135,000 head, down 6.9 per cent from a year earlier. Inventories were down in all classes of animals due to record slaughter lamb and sheep prices in 2015 that encouraged marketings.

Ewes, at 86,500 head, were 3.0 per cent below January 1, 2015. Replacement lambs declined 7.4 per cent to 12,600 head, and market lambs decreased 15.5 per cent to 31,700 head. The total number of rams fell 10.6 per cent to 4,200 head.
