4-H Summer Employment

Looking for a summer job?

The Alberta 4-H Branch and the 4-H Foundation of Alberta have a number of summer staff positions available for university students. Job descriptions and application procedures will be available on the 4-H website, from your key leaders, and at some Alberta University and college employment offices by early December.

Up to seven Summer Program Assistants are required to assist the 4-H Specialist - Programs in Airdrie. These assistants help plan and implement all junior and intermediate camping programs, PDP programs, LTCS and Club Week. NLS certification is mandatory for at least three positions and all positions require First Aid certification and skills in leadership, teamwork, planning, evalua-

tion and 4-H or equivalent programs. Applicants should also have skills in writing, editing, public relations and other office related tasks.

Two Outdoor Adventure/ Program Assistants are required to assist the 4-H Foundation of Alberta and 4-H Specialist - Programs at the Alberta 4-H Centre on Battle Lake. These assistants will help implement the 4-H Foundation Outdoor Adventure program during May and June and then will assist in implementing 4-H summer programs at the Alberta 4-H Centre during July and August. NLS certification is mandatory for at least one position and both positions require First Aid certification, along with the skills listed above for the summer program assistant positions.

One Media Release Coordinator is required to work out

of the Edmonton office. This position will mainly work with the 4-H Specialist - Communication and Marketing to promote 4-H programs, prepare press releases, and assist with special projects. Excellent skills in computer programs, writing and teamwork are required.


Thank you to over 125 volunteers who committed their time as counselors, junior and senior program staff and camp parents. The 4-H members and staff appreciate your time and commitment, and

In order to prepare them for their jobs, the Key Members attended a training weekend at the Alberta 4-H Centre on October 14 -16. In between team building activities that produced lots of animal noises, and a bungee run challenge that redefined the term "elasticity", the group of Key Members present at the 4-H Centre helped establish their roles and goals for the upcoming year, and the program in general.

What are Key Members?

Key Members are senior members chosen by each district to provide extra assistance from a member's perspective. They can help in a variety of ways at the club and district level, including delivering workshops, promoting 4-H camps and programs, attending district meetings, helping on district committees, liaising with 4-H members and communicating news and updates. The term is for one year, and runs from October 1 - September 30, which follows the 4-H club year.

Key Member, it is best to call the Key Member directly AT LEAST two weeks in advance. Ensure that you give them complete details and expectations for the event. Keep in mind that they have busy schedules with school, 4-H and other extracurricular activities. Therefore, there may be times they are unavailable, but if you give them enough notice, they will do their best at fulfilling your request. Names of District Key Members are available from your Regional Specialist or Key Leader.



Programs





"I have to measure my steer's heart girth with a tape, fill in charts, tables and graphs with the weight and cost of his feed each day, and total those amounts before using division to figure out things like his rate of gain per day and if I've made any profit after I sell him," he comments. "In this way, I get practice on charts, diagrams, graphs, and all kinds of math operations (adding, subtraction, multiplication

Scholarships

Provincial 4-H Scholarship Program

107 past and present senior 4-H members have started or returned to their college or University with a little bit thicker pockets. Thanks to the generous support of 50 sponsors, members received scholarships (ranging from \$200 to \$1,500) totaling \$71,065 through the Alberta 4-H Scholarship Program. In 2005, 52 percent of applicants received a scholarship.

Regional breakdown of recipients is as follows:

South - 12 out of 35 (34%) applicants were awarded scholarships totaling \$8,675.

Calgary - 9 out of 30 (30%) applicants were awarded scholarships totaling \$6,100.

West Central - 19 out of 36 (53%) applicants were awarded scholarships totaling \$13,620.

East Central - 7 out of 16 (44%) applicants were awarded scholarships totaling \$5,150.



What Makes a Great 4-H Presentation?

Demonstrations and illustrated talks rely on visual information in addition to the spoken word. Ask members who have done a few presentations and they will say, pick the right topic, use good visuals and practice.

Topic Choice

Some topics lend themselves to showing how to make an item or to do an activity. Look at the different parts of your presentation. Can you demonstrate how to do each step, make an item or illustrate a process? Some topics are best left as wonderful speeches if you cannot find ways to effectively illustrate the majority of the information except by a few words on a poster. If there is more than one presenter, is there enough for each to do?

Use Visuals

Think about what needs to be and what can be illustrated. Use real objects before models and models before pictures or diagrams. Be creative.

Make the most of the opportunity to show your audience what you are talking about in your presentation. The people throughout the room should be able to see what you are doing. Raise the table height, hold small objects high, and in handling any items work so that the audience can best see what you are doing. Remember the main purpose is for the audience to have the best view so they can learn by observing your actions.

Posters and computer prepared images can serve to summarize, focus attention and get points across that words alone won't accomplish. Keep this written information simple, brief and large enough be seen by the whole audience, not just the first row.

If you have an illustration or brought an item as part of your presentation, use it. At the same time, don't get lost in your props. When you are finished with an item, put it to the side or behind you. By the end of the demonstration your completed item should be front and center and the rest of the tools and items are out of sight.

Practice

In an illustrated talk and a demonstration you not only need to talk about your subiect but also at the same time handle different props. Practice enables you to do this smoothly, to move about, adding and taking away objects. Add a partner and it becomes especially important to practice and share the speaking and showing. Know your subject and the competition rules. Anticipate questions and work to have them answered in your presentation.

Demonstrations and illustrated talks are a great way to learn communication skills. Take advantage of their unique characteristics enhance your presentation skills.

Being An Effective District Council Representative

As with many things in life (so they say), the key to being an effective Club Representative to the District 4-H Council is communication. As a representative to the District Council you are an important link for your club to the events and opportunities that the District Council is responsible for. These include various events, such as public speaking, judging, record book competitions and member retreats.

Communicate the topics under discussion at the district meetings to your club. As your club rep, you are responsible for ensuring that your club knows about district events and competi-

tions. You are in a unique position to push your club members to become involved in opportunities beyond the club level by bringing them the information from District Council meetings.

Communicate with your District Council the activities that your club is up to. You have the opportunity to bring the concerns of your club to the District Council and have your voice heard. If your club has a great idea for a social event or training workshop, that you could use the cooperation of other clubs on, the District Council is the place to raise such ideas. Remember that as a representative, you have voting power on the District Council. Do you know how your club would vote on certain issues? Is your club aware of the issues that you are voting on?

Be prepared. Review the meeting agenda before going to the meeting and think of ways the topics might affect your club. Ask the members of your club if they have anything to share on a specific issue. You may want to prepare a list of questions or points that you would like clarified. Also, have your club report ready. What are some key activities your club does that you want to highlight? Identify points that your club wants to communicate to the District Council. Is there a spot in your club meeting agenda for reports from the District Council? And what will you say when your turn comes up? What news can you bring them from the District Council? Are there any items that require feedback from the club? The more your club is informed, the greater voice they will have in District Council, through you.

Ask yourself some basic questions about your role as club representative to assess your effectiveness: Is your club aware of District activities? Are members involved? Do you want/need more member participation? Does the District Council know what's going on in your club?

Your club is counting on you to bring forward their voice to the District Council, and the Council is counting on you to communicate with your club. Be the best representative that you can be for your club and your district!

Every year, each member is required to pay a \$30 provincial registration fee. This fee is used exclusively to cover the costs of: developing and printing educational and club reference materials; developing and delivering provincial member and leader programs; and running provincial competitions and events.

Each region may also charge an additional fee for insurance for members, leaders and other registered volunteers; and programs and events they provide.

In total, about 12 percent of Alberta 4-H program and project development funding comes from member fees, 10 percent from program fees (fees associated with attending a regional or provincial program), and 78 percent from sponsor support.

The 4-H website (www.4h. ab.ca) is proving to be one of the most useful tools for members, leaders, and families to access 4-H information and resources. Applicationforms, project resources, program information, and 4-H news can all be found whenever you need them, 24 hours a day.

Below are a few tips to help you utilize the website to it's full potential.

Read the right hand side of the main page. This will ensure that you don't miss out on a terrific 4-H opportunity. The most current and important information for the specific time of year will be highlighted here. For example, public speaking and presentations resources will be located on the main page from January to April, the time frame of when com-

munications activities take place (this information, as well as all other information can also be found year round under one of the main topic headings or in the resources section of the website).

Read your region's webpage (located under the main heading called 'regions'). Here you can learn about offers and events taking place specifically within your region.

Visit the resources section to download club resources, project books and leader information. To access this section, click on resources on the left hand side of the page. The username is alberta4h and the password is cleaver.

Check back regularly. Updates are continuously being made.

To give easier access to applications, a new heading called 'Applications and Forms' has been created. Look under this heading for information and application forms for scholarships, award opportunities, programs and club grants, as well as project related forms. In addition, the online Leader's Quiz can be found under this heading.

The resources section of the 4-H website (www.4h.ab.ca) is password protected and is for the use of 4-H members and leaders only.

The username for the resources section is alberta4h and the password is cleaver.

HINT: Designate a member from your club (typically the club reporter) to visit the links on the main page as well as the club's respective region's page before each club meeting. This person can then provide this information to club member's to ensure that they all know of the opportunities available.

Making Your 4-H Meetings Fun

Would you ever conduct your 4-H meetings standing up? Start with the adjournment andworkbackwards through the agenda? Serve popcorn during the meeting? While the business you are conducting is serious, you can still make your meetings interesting and fun.

Planning

Planning well balanced meetings is a challenge to leaders and the executive. Remember that the brain can absorb only as much as the bottom can endure! Too often clubs get "bogged down" with the business aspects of the meeting and forget that the project and recreation or social activities are just as important. Clubs should only spend about 1/3 of their time on the business meeting. Here's how to "get the most" from that time.

- Have an agenda and stick to it
- Understand parliamentary procedure and how and when to use it.
- Control dominant members by saying "that's interesting but let's hear from someone we have not heard from yet".
- Use committees effectively to avoid long, drawn-out discussions at meetings.
- Break up long meetings with refreshment breaks, short games, socializing time.
- Encourage everyone to participate at meetings. Try giving everyone three pennies at each meeting. They must "spend one" every time they talk. No borrowing...
- Use small group discussions when too many people want to speak on an item. That way everyone can have more "air time".

Plan meetings that start with a pot-luck supper or end with a snack. Everyone likes to eat!

Set Up

Do you always set the chairs up in rows for your meeting? Or do you sit around long, skinny tables? Creative thinking doesn't always happen in straight lines! Have some fun! Allow people to be comfortable, to spread out. If appropriate, sit on the floor, sit in small groups, or play some music quietly in the background.

Social Time

Make sure each meeting has lots of time for members to socialize. This is an important part of 4-H and often one that is overlooked or not deemed to be important. Have a variety of social and recreational activities that encourage members to participate, talk to others, to mix with all age groups and to feel comfortable in the group. Often senior members can take responsibility for planning these activities.

Project Time

Teaching the project information does not have to be dry and uninteresting. Try to: make it "hands on" (Learn to do by doing) incorporate games, team challenges, guest speakers, videos, field trips, skits, demonstrations, debates. Variety is the key!

Checklist for an Effective 4-H Meeting

- has a good balance between business, social and project
- offers a chance for everyone to participate
- has creative ways to get business done
- offers new learning and opportunities for members
- recognizes members for ideas, accomplishments and so on
- offers challenging and interesting project programs for all ages that allows for "hands-on" participation
- members are enthusiastic, interested and attentive
- members work well together
- business starts and ends on time
- an agenda is prepared ahead of time
- committees are used for planning
- reports are complete but brief
- uses a "workable" form of parliamentary procedure
- members seem excited about their involvement in 4-H
- all business gets completed
- several members have the opportunity to lead social activities
- social time is something other than a traditional sport (like basketball)
- no one is put on the spot or embarrassed
- encourages involvement and communication

If you can incorporate most of these topics, chances are your club has well organized, fun meetings. A good balance of project, business, and social time with lots of member involvement brings satisfaction to members, leaders, and parents.

The 4-H Time Capsule: An event that will not soon be forgotten

4-H members and leaders, past and present, unearthed one of the largest Alberta 4-H timepieces ever created. From September 2 to 5, 2005, over 500 4-H enthusiasts, including government officials and special guests, gathered at the Alberta 4-H Centre near Battle Lake for the unearthing of the 4-H Time Capsule, buried 25 years ago in 1980.

The burial of the Time Capsule marked the official opening of the Alberta 4-H Centre as well as the celebration of Alberta's 75th anniversary. Although much has changed in the 4-H program over the past 25 years, the Time Capsule Celebration is proof positive that the 4-H spirit is as vibrant as ever. "It was very exciting to share the past and look forward to the future as friends gathered together to reminisce and share stories," says Marguerite Stark, 4-H Branch Head of Alberta



Jerrid Driedger, of Calgary, displayed his 4-H talents by putting on one entertaining magic show on Saturday evening. This 15 year-old has such a great stage presence that you would think he had been doing magic shows for more years than he is old. In addition, the Heisler Hemmers 4-H Club also put on an entertaining busking display before more than 20 4-H'ers put themselves in the hands of Hypnotist William James from Lethbridge. For more than three hours, guests in attendance were wildly entertained.

The unearthing of the Time Capsule involved a lot of digging and some creative manoeuvring with the site tractor, but it was well worth the wait. The Honourable Dallas Schmidt, 1980 Minister of Agriculture, Shirley Cripps, 1980 MLA of Drayton Valley, and Karen Weigum, 1980 4-H Premier's Award Recipient broke the ground to mark the official opening of the Time Capsule as 4-H members and leaders of all ages eagerly waited in anticipation.

The Honourable Doug Horner, Minister of Agriculture, was also in attendance to bring greetings and enjoy rediscovering 4-H as it was 25 years ago. Mr. Horner, a former 4-H member himself, discussed the importance of 4-H in Alberta, and the positive benefits it brings to those who are a part of it.

In total, more than 100 envelopes containing news clippings, photos and videos from 1980, personal and club artefacts, and letters were removed from the Time Capsule. A few of the items returned to a new Time Capsule that will be opened in 2030 while the rest were put on display for the remainder of the weekend.

Although the opening of the Time Capsule was the main event of the weekend, there was no shortage of events and activities to attend. Participants took part in the Lakedell Fair, the largest one day fair in Alberta, traditional camp activities, magic, hypnosis and busking shows, a headlining concert, with 4-H talent and the Canadian Country Award Winning Artist Gil Grand, and a professional fireworks display.

"The entire weekend was an incredible opportunity to learn about 4-H's rich history, and commemorate Alberta's centennial birthday. It was great to see that throughout the fun-filled weekend, 4-H'ers and their families found time to enjoy visiting with past 4-H acquaintances, while creating new and lasting 4-H friendships," comments Kristen Hedley, 2005 4-H Premier's Award Recipient. "Overall, the event was a huge success and 4-H'ers left the Alberta 4-H Centre with 4-H pride eagerly awaiting 2030!"

The Time Capsule Celebration was the largest Provincial 4-H event in over 10 years. The event theme: "Yesterday, Today, Forever" signifies the vast history of 4-H in this province as well as the positive direction the program is heading. It was a family event in every aspect, as young and old alike shared laughter, a glimpse of the past, and memories that will last a lifetime.



On Saturday, September 3, 2005, The Amphitheatre at the 4-H Centre was renamed the Darcy Jackson Memorial Amphitheatre in memory of Darcy Jackson, an outstanding former 4-H member. Darcy's family stands beside the dedication plaque.

After the concert, a professional fire works show lit up the skies of Battle Lake to conclude the festivities of the Time Capsule Celebration.
