#### Junior Camping Program – Striking a Chord

Members from across the province flooded Battle Lake the first week in July to attend Junior Camp 2009. For some, it marked their first-ever time at the Alberta 4-H Centre, while for others, it was a return to the place of summertime memories from years before.

This year's junior camp theme, "Striking a Chord", challenged members to find their inner song and provided members with the "notes" they would need to begin building their 4-H foundation, and laying the ground work for a successful 4-H career. # The Capacity to Communicate: Alberta 4-H's Provincial Communications Competition

On April 4, 2009, the success of Alberta 4-H's communications' program was exemplified by 43 senior-aged 4-H members, who were in Vermilion to talk, present and compete at the  $33^{\rm rd}$  Annual Provincial Public Speaking competition, and the  $7^{\rm th}$  Annual Provincial Presentations competition, both of which happen under the umbrella competition of "Provincial Communications".

On the public speaking side of things, the top two competitors from each of the seven regions rose to the occasion, with 14 4-H members delivering prepared speeches on the assigned theme of "Today's Youth". After 28 speeches in total, as each competitor had to deliver a prepared as well as an impromtu speech, the judge's pencils came to a rest and the top three competitors were announced: Chris Loomis, member of Two Hills 4-H Beef and Multi Club, was awarded third place; Ted Andrew of the Dryland 4-H Multi Club took second, and top honours went to Rosie Templeton, seven-year 4-H veteran and member of the Readymade 4-H Beef Club.

"It was an honour in itself to go to Provincials, and so winning was more than I could have imagined. It was definitely worth the six hour drive and countless hours of preparation!" explained Rosie, following the announcement of her winning the 2009 Alberta 4-H Provincial Public Speaking Competition. "As a 4-H member, I feel very lucky to have the opportunity to compete in these events and improve my abilities as a speaker. I have been working towards an accomplishment like this over my entire 4-H career."

After nearly three hours of competition, audience members and judges left the Presentations component of 4-H's Provincial Communications competition better informed on a number of topics, ranging from first aid to mummification to worms.

The 2009 top three finishers in the provincial Presentations' competition were as follows: Karli Keujer, who is a member of the Lethbridge Coaldale 4-H Beef Club, did a presentation on "Colitis", which placed her in a tie for third place with Michael Lawrence of Moutainview 4-H Dairy Club, whose session topic was titled, "TB or not TB". Second place was earned by New Pine Equine and Multi 4-H Club member Samantha Pedersen, who presented a "Wormy Affair". Jenalee Blackhurst, member

of the Bits and Spurs Equine Youth 4-H Club and the Gilby 4-H Beef Club, was awarded first place, for her entertaining "Daily Dairy" presentation.

For Jenalee, much like all 4-H members who have worked hard at advancing within 4-H's communication program, these skills are already being put to good use. "I've been approached by Key Leaders who want me to put on Presentations' workshops for the junior members in their clubs. Being asked to do this means a lot to me because it affirms what 4-H is all about: people helping people."

## Province wide Horse Enthusiasts attend 4-H Horse Classic

With 81 members from 22 Alberta 4-H light horse clubs across the province, and over 40 volunteers on hand, the  $15^{\rm th}$  Annual Provincial 4-H Horse Classic was a resounding success. Many new faces and clubs were evident at this year's event held July 29 - 31 at Olds College.

"The way this program is run, it encourages participants to use their knowledge and experience as much as possible. We are able to have three industry/project clinics during the program because of generous support from Apache Canada Ltd., Penn West Energy Trust, the Government of Alberta, Gas Alberta and Lammle's Tack and Western Wear. The programming at Horse Classic actively develops 4-H members skills by testing their horse knowledge and working on team and individual activities," says Janet Kerr, 4-H Specialist and event organizer.

Some contests are designed for individuals and others for teams. Everyone who registered for the event was automatically entered in the hippology contest, which tests members' equine knowledge through four phases - quizzes, judging, identification stations, and a team problem.

The top four members—based on individual hippology points—qualified for the Denver Western 4-H Horse Classic Award Trip, to be held in January 2010. Matthew Paton (Bits and Spurs), Katie Garber (Milk River Multi), Sarah Richards (Midnight Express 4-H Horse) and Lindsey Grover (Big Valley Outriders) are this year's trip recipients.



Enthusiasm and vigour were in the air between June 28 and July 3 as 76 senior members from all corners of the province came together for the immensely popular counselor-in-training program, Leadership Through Counseling Seminar (LTCS).

En route to the meeting, we were treated to a great Italian dinner, and then it was time to make our Legislative appearance.

As a means of providing balance to the week's programming, and in order to fulfill one of Alberta 4-H's #1 objectives, Club Week also provided delegates with ample opportunity for fun! From mini-Olympics and a Wild West BBQ, to a Masquerade dance and a County Fair, to Fun Frolics and a talent show, Club Week-ers had the time of their life, reconnecting with old friends and establishing connections to new ones.

"This year's Club Week was a success, not only in terms of the number of delegates in attendance and the amount of fun that was had, but also accounting for the program's main objectives having been met," reviewed Mark Shand, 4-H Programs Specialist and Club Week Program Director. "It is outstanding to see the commitment of the youth and their parents to both the cattle industry and 4-H, despite the challenges they have been facing."

One of the highlights of this year's event was a visit from Maria Stevens, Denver National Judging Competition High Point Champion, who traveled from her home state of Kansas to attend the show as a judge.

The show team judging class, where two competitors are paired up and one acts as the judge and the other as the ring person, was an intense competition. In the end Riley Sharp (East Lacombe 4-H Multi) and Zane Bennett (East Lacombe 4-H Multi) took first place in the junior division, Tyler Dietrich (Hastings Coulee 4-H Beef) and Andie Hadway (West

Didsbury 4-H Multi) won the intermediate division, and Anthony Murphy (Lakedell 4-H Beef) and Tyson Hertz (John Ware 4-H Beef) took home top honours as the senior team judging champions.

Member interaction was regarded as being at an all-time high, which can partially be accredited to the new "Buddy System" that was established this year. This unique initiative paired returning Provincial Beef Heifer Show competitors with new entrants so that they could get acclimated to the show's atmosphere.

At the end of the show, two Supreme champions were crowned. Taking home the ultimate top prize for Supreme Purebred Champion was Rhianna Congdon (Nebraska 4-H Multi), and the Supreme Commercial Champion honours went to Tyson Hertz (John Ware 4-H Beef).

Those that attended the 2009 Provincial Beef Heifer Show said that they though the event was a tremendous success. The show's planning committee is already back at work ensuring that next year is as good, if not better, than this year's event.

# The Ins and Outs of Interviews

Good morning Ms. Thorlacius, to start off, can you please describe for me a time when you had to use your problem solving skills to resolve an issue in the workplace?

Well there was that one time when I couldn't figure out how to fix the printer... no wait, don't say that... oh no... palms are getting sweaty... not good for shaking hands before leaving... um, well...

Yes, the job interview. For some of us, giving a good interview comes naturally and is the perfect opportunity to have someone's undivided attention while you talk about yourself! But for many of us, it is an intimidating experience where you are stuck in the spotlight without a script. Whether you are applying for your first job or practicing for interviews down the road, there are some definite tricks of the trade that will help you along the way.

First off, the interview is your time to shine and allows you to give the employer a dynamic reason why you are the best person for the job. From an employer's perspective, it is their opportunity to see how you process and respond to questions, giving them a better idea of your qualifications and suitability for the position. Think of the interview as dialogue rather than a question and answer test. It will help you feel more comfortable and the conversation will flow more naturally.

Second off, remember to listen, think and breathe. Although answering questions at an interview can be nerveracking and the desire to blurt out the first thing, and everything that comes to your head can be tempting, one of the most important keys to a successful interview is the ability to thoughtfully respond to a question. Lucky for you, 4-H members are ahead of the game on this one because it is just like doing the impromptu component of public speaking. After hearing an employer's question, take the time to think through your answer and then respond. It might feel like 10 minutes of awkward silence, but in reality, only a few seconds have gone by.

Finally, do your homework! "It is really impressive when candidates come in for an interview and have researched the company and the job and have looked at the company's website. By asking intelligent questions, it shows that you have come prepared," says Linda Shea, Senior Vice President of Human Resources at AltaLink.

So get your resumes and hand shakes ready, you now know the keys to interview success!

#### **4-H Clubs are Communities**

The nature of communities is changing. Previously, communities were based on the place where people came together but more and more communities are based not on place, but common interests. 4-H clubs are communities - families come together with a common interest in a project or improving personal skills.

Although families come together to form the community of a 4-H club, it is important to remember that the club belongs to the members. The 4-H motto is "Learn to do by Doing". The "doing" in the motto refers not only to learning projects skills, but learning how to work in groups, how decisions are made in groups and ways to improve leadership abilities. Members should be making the decisions about what will happen in their club. The role of adults involved with a club is to provide guidance and support to the members, not to make decisions. Adults have responsibility to be good role models for by modeling the behaviour they would expect their members to exhibit. This can be done by assisting members to work effectively on committees, helping them to prepare reports for club meetings, respecting the wishes of the majority even when it does not agree with yours and communicating effectively with members and adults in the club.

According to the "Creating Communities Australia" website "a functioning community is one which "the resources and energies of a community are harnessed and focused in common directions." 4-H clubs also function best when the resources and energies of the club are harnessed and focused in common directions. Communities that don't function well are always in turmoil. People can't agree on any sort of direction for the community to go in. In 4-H clubs, this dissension usually occurs between the adults. Rarely when we hear of problems in 4-H clubs does it originate with members. Adults have a responsibility to model effective conflict resolution methods. Stop and take a look at where you are coming from in the conflict. What are your personal biases and triggers? What would the successful outcome of the conflict be? Usually in any conflict there are two sides and both have perceptions that may or may not be correct. Usually "right" is somewhere between the two sides and there may be ways to come to a "win-win" solution. Find a safe place to negotiate. Don't argue loudly in front of members. This usually does not accomplish anything except to discourage members from wanting to continue their membership in the club. Hone your listening skills. Take the time to actively listen to what others are saying. State your needs clearly and specifically using "I" messages. Identify the issues clearly and concisely, generate options, be open to tangents and clarify criteria for decision making. If you come to an impasse, clarify feelings, focus on needs and if necessary take a break, and finally build an agreement that works.

Remember that a 4-H club is a community – make it one that you would like to be involved with!

This was an absolutely amazing trip, and I would encourage any member who is looking at applying for Selections in May 2010 to put this trip down as one of their choices. Not only was I in-





Geocaching is a world-wide treasure hunt that uses high-tech Global Positioning System (GPS) equipment to locate a hidden "cache" filled with trinkets. You must enroll through the official geocaching website in order to participate, and then once you're signed up, you can hunt for hidden caches all over the world! They can be concealed deep in the woods, out in a field, strewn in the streets, and just about anywhere else you can imagine.

Once you find a cache, if you want to take something, you have to leave something behind of equal or more value. The point of the cache items isn't that they are truly valuable - frequently they are just a wind-up toy or a pin. The point of geocaching is to explore an area and look for something. This activity really is about the searching, not the actual finding.

Sometimes you will find an item that is a dog-collar tag that has a bug on it. This is a "Traveling Bug". Items with these tags have been all over the world, and should you take it, you must deposit it in another cache in order for it to condition.





Many 4-H'ers in Alberta already know Danny Hertz as a 4-H Ambassador, a Provincial Judging Champion and a USA National 4-H Conference award trip delegate. What many don't know is that Danny has recently added the title of Intern at the Canadian Embassy onto his list of notable accomplishments.

In May of this year, Danny embarked on a dream job in Washington D.C. Working alongside major players in the Canadian and United States governments, as well as researching topics that will eventually become talking points for Canadian Cabinet Ministers would be enough to intimidate most people, but it's yet to faze Danny.

"The communication skills and confidence that I have were first developed by participating in 4-H related activities like public speaking and taking part in many of the summer programs and the Key Member program," says Danny. Most significantly, these experiences have helped me to reach out to new people and strike up a conversation about pretty much anything."

Danny is taking this information and working to show how protectionist provisions hurt both countries in the long run. When he is not doing that, Danny is working on planning a biotechnology conference showcasing Canadian businesses, which is slated for September."

Luckily, it is not all work for Danny, as he does have Friday afternoons and his weekends free.

"I've been trying to make the most out of my summer here, and this usually keeps me pretty busy. I've been to most of the museums in the city, Arlington Cemetery three times, Mount Vernon (George Washington's Estate), several baseball games and a few other random events. Next month I am planning to travel to New York and hopefully Philadelphia, if I have the time that is," says Danny.

Danny is excited for the challenges that lay ahead next summer, as he moves on to new and exciting projects, hopefully in an equally excited geographic area.

"I would like to get some business experience next summer, and right now I am looking to work either in Quebec or overseas," says Danny. "Ideally, I'll find another challenging but rewarding job in a cool city and meet some exciting people. That's been the best part of this one!"

## Highways + Trees + Electronics + Tires + Alberta 4-H Clubs = A Winning Formula!

From its conception in 1917, Alberta 4-H has prided itself on its members' community service efforts, its agriculturally-based programming and the organization's lean towards environmental awareness.

And so in 1977, when the Alberta Highway Cleanup was initiated on the first weekend in May, 4-H members supported it wholly. Highway Cleanup was, and still is, a volunteer opportunity that clubs can choose to participate in to serve their community and the environment. Thirty-two years later, 4-H continues to support and participate in the annual event, with this year's efforts resulting in 7100 kilometers of highway being cleaned and 47,313 garbage bags being filled!

"I thought it was a lot of fun," Olds Outlaws 4-H Horse Club member Taylor Schaber commented. "It was cool to have the entire club picking up garbage as it made the highway look cleaner and nicer, and hopefully even more people will want to help out next year too!"

And 4-H's "green" efforts don't stop at highways. This year was the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Trees for My Community, another community service initiative. This year, 19 clubs participated in planting more than 1800 tree saplings across the province.

The tree saplings are supplied, for free, by the Tree Canada Foundation; the saplings are then planted on community or public land as an independent green space initiative.

"It was a wonderful experience for our 4-H club to be involved in such an important aspect of our environment. We feel as though we have made a difference in our community, and we had a lot of fun while doing so. Planting trees was an easy way to help make our environment just a little bit greener!" summarizes a member from the Starlite 4-H Multi Club.

The newest green initiative headed up by 4-H, now in its fourth year, is the tire and electronic waste recycling program, which runs collections twice a year. The tire recycling program began as a pilot initiative in the Northwest region, to implement recycled rubber mats at the 4-H livestock shows in the Northwest and Northeast regions. This initiative was made possible by the Tire Recycling Management Association (TRMA). After the success of that project, a plan came into effect for a region-wide tire collection effort. The purpose of this effort was to collect tires from agricultural sources only, in spring and in fall, as a club fundraiser that benefited the community.

In fall of 2005, tire collection was extended to the rest of the province. By fall of 2007, over 62,000 tires were collected. In





spring of 2008, more than 45,000 tires were collected. From 2005-2007, the tire recycling program has generated almost \$300,000 for Alberta 4-H clubs.

Ninety-two years after inception, Alberta 4-H continues to embrace its members' community-minded spirits, and continues to explore the various ways that clubs and communities can partner, flourish and subsequently benefit. 
In her free time, Mrs. Stelmach enjoys spending time with her children and grandchildren at the family farm and their home in the city.
